Impact of Breast Cervical and Bowel screening Awareness Programme

People living in Northern Ireland are entitled to free health services, including screening Programmes, but it is often the case that people most marginalised do not access these services. Our Breast Cervical and Bowel screening Awareness Programme aims to work with hard to reach groups to:

Give them the support and confidence necessary to access them

The rest of this article looks at the impact that the programme has both on the Community Facilitators who deliver the programme and on participants who attend the programmes

Impact on Community Facilitator

My name is Thomasina Birt and I live a few miles outside Portglenone, Co. Antrim. I qualified as a facilitator 5 years ago and have delivered a number of BCB

programmes to various types of groups in the Northern Trust area. Participants

vary in age, middle aged, retired, young mums and some gentlemen in the Bowel sessions.

My sister was a lone parent to 7 children and died of cancer at the age of 49, that was 10 years ago. Because of this, I fully understand the importance of the BCB programme and the invaluable information it provides to those in the community especially about prioritising their own health. The majority of people nowadays have some experience with cancer whether it be through a family member, work colleague or themselves and the main priority is early diagnosis to work out a treatment plan. Fortunately, the Breast Cervical and Bowel Screening awareness Programme provides the information to help with recognition of symptoms but also the importance of using the screening services when notified. Many people think they know all there is to know in relation to signs and symptoms but find when they participate in a BCB programme there is always something new to them and they become more aware of the importance of screening tests.

Learning how to do breast self-examination correctly is a key factor in the programme, one lady's friend had confided in her about finding a lump. She was very glad she had just (cont. P4)

completed the Breast Session the week before and was able to reassure her friend and encouraged her to get it checked out immediately. It turned out to be a benign cyst but she said without the information from the Breast Session she wouldn't have been able to keep her composure and wouldn't have had the knowledge to speak to her about it. One time in a Bowel Session, I was explaining not to solely rely on a FOB kit as sometimes it may come back clear even when cancer is present. One lady in the group spoke up and said that's what happened her. I was glad of this as it reiterated the fact to be aware of all signs and symptoms and that screening tests, important as they are, are not infallible. Many are shocked to know that cervical cancer may not show any signs or symptoms until the latter stage and realise now the importance of going for regular smears. When they see the tools involved it reduces their fear and are not as intimidated by the thought of it any more. The beads are also a useful visual tool and many are shocked when they are told the large bead could be the size of lump in someone who doesn't examine themselves regularly. When they are shown the bead a mammogram can pick up, it makes them realise they need to go when they are called as this could possibly save their life. I wish my sister had been able to attend a BCB programme, if she had, she might still be alive today.

Impact on Participants

Another example of the impact of the Breast Cervical and Bowel screening Programme was in a women's Group in Co Down. After doing the Breast Cervical and bowel screening awareness Programme one woman found a lump in her breast and went to her GP who referred her for further tests. She was diagnosed with breast cancer and is now going through chemotherapy.

For this lady attending the programme was life changing and she has been passionate about trying to get the message across of the importance of screening and self-examination to other women.

Conclusion

In every group that the WRDA works with to deliver breast cervical and bowel screening awareness Programme there is nearly always at least one participant who goes and gets a concern checked out and is either reassured or referred for further investigation. As you can see these sessions can be lifesaving.

The Public Health Agency has a contract with WRDA to deliver Breast Cervical and Bowel screening awareness Programmes to hard to reach groups across Northern Ireland. As well as providing information and awareness sessions the participants are encouraged to attend for screening sessions when invited. The programme is normally delivered over three two hour sessions but we can also deliver a standalone bowel session if there are any Mens Groups. There is no cost to groups that participate.

WRDA Programmes are delivered by experienced trainers qualified to Level 3 in Training and Development through WRDA's Community Facilitators Training Programme
